

This Great Feast is important for all Orthodox Christians to celebrate. It is equal to Christmas and one of the oldest Feasts of the Church.

While Christmas celebrates our Lord's birth "in the secrecy of a cave," Epiphany celebrates, for the Orthodox, the public *appearance* of our Lord at His baptism and the *appearance* of God as Trinity: The Father speaking from heaven, the Son standing in the Jordan, the Holy Spirit descending as a dove. The word "epiphany" means *appearance*, and sometimes the Feast is also called "Theophany," meaning the appearance of God. In the Great Blessing of Water, we pray for God to be present in the water and through it to give us healing and purification as we drink from it and with it bless our homes.

It is important for all Orthodox Christians to celebrate this Feast Day.

"Church Etiquette" Tip of the Week

When we gather to worship God, Orthodox Christians are "at home" in the environment of the Church gathering and yet at the same time reverent. These tips on "Church etiquette" explain some of the common customs that contribute to the reverent atmosphere of Orthodox worship. They are intended as guidelines to observe, not as a means to judge one another, which by a higher law we are forbidden from doing. (We will be adding a 'Tip of the Week' for the next several weeks in the bulletin.)

#3: Excusing Yourself from a Service

The normal time to arrive at church is before the service begins. So too the normal time to leave the church is after the final blessing and after venerating the Icon in the center of the church or the Cross if it is held by the priest. Sometimes it is necessary to excuse yourself from a service while it is going on. If this is necessary, it is a reverent custom to face the altar when you reach the door and make the sign of the Cross while bowing. Bowing and crossing yourself is not necessary after the final blessing when everyone is exiting together, as this would cause congestion at the doors. The same is true during the week if you are in the church at a time when there is no service held. There are a few times it is better not to exit, unless it is urgent. These times would be during the Little or Great Entrances at Liturgy, during Scripture readings (especially the Epistle or Gospel), and when the deacon or priest is censing.

#### **THE SYNAXARION**

#### **Theopemptos & Theonas – January 5**



Today in the Holy Orthodox Church is the Eve, or the Paramony, of the Epiphany of our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ. On January 5, we also commemorate the holy Martyrs **Theopemptos**, bishop of Nicomedia, and **Theonas** the former magician.

Verses

Theopemptos declares, I die with my head severed by the sword With him, the martyr Theonas proclaims the words of David in the Psalm:

"They laid me in the lowest pit."

On the fifth, Theopemptos left this life with the help of a sword.

Theopemptos was among the first to suffer martyrdom under Emperor Diocletian, who threatened him with death if he did not deny Christ. The courageous bishop responded to the emperor: "It stands written, 'Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul." Theopemptos suffered from hunger and was tortured in various ways. Finally, the emperor summoned the magician Theonas to outwit this Godly man through magic. Theonas dissolved the most potent poison in water and gave it to Theopemptos to drink. The bishop Theopemptos traced the sign of the cross over the glass and drank the poison. Theonas, upon seeing that the poison had no effect on Theopemptos, turned to the emperor and shouted, "Because of this sight, I, too, am a Christian and bow down before the Crucified One." Theopemptos died by the sword, and Theonas was buried alive. Both entered the Kingdom in 298.

On January 5, we also commemorate Venerable **Syncletica** of Alexandria and Venerablemartyr Romanos of Athos. By their intercessions, O Christ God, have mercy upon us. Amen.
