

### "Church Etiquette" Tip of the Week

When we gather to worship God, Orthodox Christians are "at home" in the environment of the Church gathering and yet at the same time reverent. These tips on "Church etiquette" explain some of the common customs that contribute to the reverent atmosphere of Orthodox worship. They are intended as guidelines to observe, not as a means to judge one another, which by a higher law we are forbidden from doing. (We will be adding a 'Tip of the Week' for the next several weeks in the bulletin.)

#### **#4: Passing Across the Front of the Church**

If you pass along the front of the Church from one side to the other during a service, it is customary to pause at the center, bow toward the altar, and make the sign of the Cross. One reason this is done is because on the back of the altar is a container in which holy communion is reserved for those who are unable to come to Church because of illness. This container is called a "tabernacle", and it can take various forms. Pausing in this way acknowledges the holiness of the altar and of the communion which is reserved there. It is good to practice reverence in the Church services. At the same time, it is never good to be showy or dramatic.

### **Tatiana of Rome – January 12**

On January 12, we continue to celebrate the Epiphany of our Lord Jesus Christ, and we also commemorate the holy Martyr Tatiana of Rome, the Deaconess, and those with her.

#### Verses

For Tatiana, who gave glory to God in all things,
The bright sword gave her head a glorious wreath.
On the twelfth, they trimmed Tatiana's neck with a
wreath of glory.

Tatiana lived during the reign of Emperor Alexander Severus, whose chief assistants persecuted Christians without the emperor's orders. When they brought out the virgin Tatiana for torture, she prayed to God for her torturers. And behold, their eyes were opened, and

they saw four angels around the martyr. Seeing this, eight of them believed in Christ, and this caused them to be tortured and slain too. The tormentors continued to disfigure Tatiana, but God sent His angels to the dungeon to encourage her and to heal her wounds. Each morning, Tatiana appeared before the torturers completely healed. Finally, Tatiana and her father were both beheaded in about the year 225. Thus, this heroic woman and those with her were crowned with immortal wreaths of glory.

On this day, we also commemorate the Martyr Peter Absalom of Palestine; Virgin-martyr Euthasia; and Martyr Mertios of Mauretania. By their intercessions, O Christ God, have mercy upon us. Amen.
