Two Saturdays ago SMMS partnered with Brothers of Lazarus and did a 4 1/5 hour lunch shift together at the Downtown Hope Soup Kitchen. Typically, the kitchen hands out about 400 lunches every day to men and women. We cooked, served, sorted clothes, cleaned, colored and did nails with the ladies that live there. I have taken people once a week since March to serve at the dinner shift (one hour) in the evenings and we do a long lunch shift once every couple of months. Roughly 25 of us have at some point signed up and served here since March. It has been so great to see so many of us get involved and help those in our community. Acts of service is a core value of our church and anyone who has been there has loved coming.

# Holy Prophet King Solomon Feast Day – December 13 "Wisdom built her house and she supported it."

The Prophet-King Solomon (ca. 972 - 932 B.C.) was the son of David and Bathsheba. He succeeded his father as King and reigned for forty years. He built the palace and the Temple at Jerusalem and was renowned for his wisdom. The Old Testament books of Proverbs, the Song of Songs, and the Wisdom of Solomon are attributed to him. He may have written parts of these books, but much of the material was probably transmitted orally before it was written down. In the Gospels, Christ mentions Solomon by name, citing his glory and wisdom (Matthew 6:29; 12:42).


#### Jacob of Hamatoura - October 13

On October 13, in the Holy Orthodox Church, we commemorate the Martyrs Karpos, Papylos, Agathodoros and Agathonika at Pergamos.

On this day, we commemorate the Venerable Hieromartyr Jacob of Hamatoura. This saint struggled in asceticism at the Monastery of the Dormition of the Most-holy Theotokos of Hamatoura in Lebanon. His heroic spiritual labors soon brought him to the attention of the authorities who, being jealous of his fame, determined to convert him from his faith in Jesus Christ to Islam. St. Jacob adamantly refused. Eventually, they dragged him with a number of monks and laymen to Tripoli, Lebanon where St. Jacob endured harsh tortures for a year, before he was beheaded and burned on October 13, 1450.



# Fathers of the 7th Ecumenical Council – Sunday, October 11-17



On this day we commemorate the holy and blessed Fathers who came together for the seventh Ecumenical Council; the second time that such a council assembled in Nicaea. This took place during the reign of the pious and Christ-loving Emperors Constantine and Irene. The Council met against those who impiously, ignorantly and foolishly asserted that the Church of God worships idols, and against those who rejected the eminent and holy icons.

#### Verses

Your champions, O Word, with words as their weapons, Turn to flight the foes of the venerable icons.

The Council met in 787 to refute the Iconoclast heresy, whose camp believed that all depictions of Christ, His Mother and the saints should be destroyed. But the iconophiles believed that icons served to

preserve the doctrinal teachings of the Church, and they considered icons to be man's dynamic way of expressing the divine, through art and beauty. The Council decreed that the veneration of icons was not idolatry, because the honor shown to them is not directed to the wood or paint, but passes to the prototype, or the person depicted. It also upheld the possibility of depicting Christ, Who became man and took flesh at His Incarnation. The Father, on the other hand, cannot be represented in His eternal nature, because "no man has seen God at any time."

By the intercessions of the Holy Fathers, O Christ God, have mercy upon us. Amen.
