The **Meeting of the Lord in the Temple** (also called the **Presentation**) is one of the Great Feasts of the Orthodox Church, celebrated on Feb 2. In the Gospel of Luke 2:22-40, Mary and Joseph took the infant Christ to

the Temple in Jerusalem. He was received in the arms of the elder Simeon, who then prayed, "Now let Thy servant depart in peace... for I have seen Thy salvation." This was one of the things that Mary "pondered in her heart"—the fact that others recognized that her Son was the Messiah.




Women's Retreat 2025

"Church Etiquette" Tip of the Week

When we gather to worship God, Orthodox Christians are "at home" in the environment of the Church gathering and yet at the same time reverent. These tips on "Church etiquette" explain some of the common customs that contribute to the reverent atmosphere of Orthodox worship. They are intended as guidelines to observe, not to judge one another, which by a higher law we are forbidden from doing. (We will be adding a 'Tip of the Week' for the next several weeks in the bulletin.)

When to Make the Sign of the Cross upon Oneself

When to make the sign of the Cross upon oneself is a matter of personal piety and not so much matter of strict practice. The following are sometimes when it is specifically proper to cross yourself and times when you should not.

Cross yourself at these times...

- when you hear the prayer invoking God as the Holy Trinity, "Father, Son and Holy Spirit".
- at the beginning and end of liturgical services and your private prayers.
- before venerating an icon, a relic, the cross or Gospel book.
- when entering or exiting the church
- when passing in front of the holy altar table.

Do not make the sign of the cross upon yourself when...

- you are at the chalice before or after taking communion (you might hit the chalice with your hand); instead, cross your arms over your chest, right arm on top of the left.
- the priest or bishop blesses saying "peace be to all" bow slightly and receive the blessing.
- receiving a blessing from a bishop or a priest (kissing the right hand of the bishop or priest is appropriate but not making the sign of the cross).





THE SYNAXARION

Meeting of the Lord – February 2



Verses

As the hands of righteous Simeon bear You, O my Christ, they depict the bosom of Your Father. On the second, Simeon receives Christ in the Temple.

The Greek word for the feast means "Encounter" or "Meeting." However, this was not just some chance encounter. This feast, which

closes the cycle of the Nativity of our Lord, reminds us that on the fortieth day after the birth of her first-born Son, Mary carried Him to the Temple in accordance with the Mosaic Law to offer Him to the Lord, and to ransom Him by the sacrifice of a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons. In one of many acts of extreme humility, our divine Lord lowers Himself and submits to the law in order to fulfill it. This lowering is also Jesus' first official encounter with His people in the person of Simeon. It is not only an encounter, but also a manifestation. Simeon bears in his arms the One he knows to be the Salvation of the world, "a light to lighten the Gentiles, and the glory of Your people Israel." His endearing prayer, as found in the Gospel of Luke, endures in the Orthodox Church to this day. The Church considers this celebration as a Feast of the Theotokos in praise of her role in this Presentation, and her connection with the work of her Son. As it is said in one of the Aposticha verses: "Adorn your chamber, O Zion, and receive Christ the King. Welcome Mary the heavenly gate; for she has appeared as a cherubic throne, and she carries the King of glory." The Virgin today accompanies the Child in His first offering to the Father; she will also accompany Him even to the realization of His sacrifice for humanity.

Unto the one true God be glory and dominion unto the ages. Amen.
